Great Britain-Ireland

In many conversations with colleagues and members, it has been striking that for many of us these last months have been a time of deepening. In regard to the Act of Consecration of Man, this may have come about through needing to stay away, but noticing that it was possible to take part from afar; it may have come about through experiencing the reality of the communion even when we were not coming forward to receive it; it may have been too as we noticed how sorely the world needed the values that we live by when we celebrate together. This September marks 99 years since the founding of The Christian Community in a world that was going through social and political upheaval. It is good to feel that the relevance and vitality of our task have not diminished over the last 99 years.

Following discussion in the Synod, we took the decision not to plan an Annual Meeting this year due to the uncertain situation regarding travel and accommodation. After a two-year gap, we hope to be able to meet again next year, the centenary year of the foundation of The Christian Community. In a region such as ours, where most congregations are relatively far apart, it can be a challenge to extend our awareness to the whole Region. Nevertheless, our Annual Meetings have often given rise to rewarding and deepening experiences.

We welcomed Nataliia Shatna to Forest Row in September. Nataliia was born in Ukraine. She was ordained in March this year. Paul Corman will be helping out in Stroud for the autumn and winter, whilst we continue to look for a second priest for Stroud. Selina Horn (Forest Row) is on maternity leave.

Progress on our translation work has been carrying on rather more slowly than we hoped, due to the extraordinary circumstances we have been in. Following discussion in the Synod, we now have a version that replaces Thee and Thy with You and Your, which we expect to sign off at our synod in the autumn. We are expecting to adopt this version in Advent. We have left one question open to live with over the summer, namely the opening words of the Lord's Prayer. We are living with three possible translations, and we decided to sound out our members about these possibilities. We hope that we will be able to inform our discussions at the Synod in October with the feelings and insights of the members.

North- and Northwest Germany

There has not been a report from the Northern Germany region (Schleswig-Holstein/Hamburg/Mecklenburg-Vorpommern) for a while. Over the last two years there have been some changes within the priesthood of the congregations: Friederike Waizenegger from Hamburg-Blankenese and Rasa Kabailaite from Kiel have taken up new sendings in 2019, and Gerrit Balonier from Hamburg-Mitte became priest-emeritus at the end of 2020. Newly appointed to the congregations were Annette Semrau to Kiel, Martina Alexi to Greifswald and Tiu in't Veld to Schwerin, as well as Luke Barr to Hamburg-Mitte. There was a major change in the Schwerin-Rostock-Greifswald affiliated congregations during this time: In addition to Dorothea Wolber, who is priest in Rostock, T in't Veld has now been seconded to Schwerin and M Alexi to Greifswald, and thus for the first time these congregations have their own priests working there. This was made possible by the decision to fill these positions as half-time employment, as these congregations are unable to support a full-time position. In this way, however, the development and the desire for more independence was met, and this has a very positive effect on the congregational life.

The "meeting of all people active in our congregations" on Ascension Day at Lake Mözen, which has almost become a tradition, had to be cancelled again in 2020 and 2021 because of the Corona situation. In the coming years, we will try to continue this four-day meeting, which is regularly attended by about 70 to 80 people.

It was different with the meeting on Gotland in Sweden in the summer: This meeting ('In the Footsteps of the Baltic Mysteries'), which has regularly taken place since 2015 with participants from a wide variety of congregations and all regions (Scandinavia, Northern Germany, Baltic States, Poland, Russia) around the Baltic Sea, was also held in 2020 ("Out of the Powerlessness of Time. ../Utifrån tidens vanmakt...") with 40 people and 2021 ("Healing as grace/Läkedom som Nåd") with almost 80 people. In times of Corona, these were incredibly enriching and light-filled encounters.

After the original large region of Northern Germany had been divided in 2017/18 through the appointment of two lenkers (Joachim Paulus in Bremen and Christian Bartholl in Hamburg), a regional meeting was only held once a year as a corporate meeting, previously there were two. Since then, in place of the second meeting, invitations were sent out for so-called regional meetings, where the focus is not on dealing with formal regulations, but on dealing with a current topic of our society in addition to reports from our region and other regional bodies. For example, the most recent meeting took place on 18 September in Lübeck with 45 people attending on the topic of: "Living and Let live – the Basic Maxim of the Free Human Being".

It is nice to note that such events are not only attended by the usual participants of the corporate meetings, but really speak to a wider circle of members and friends.

Last but not least, we would like to report that the conversion and renovation work on the building at Mittelweg 13 in Hamburg, which was home to the Hamburg Seminary from 2001 to 2016, and which had guest rooms and a priest's flat on the 4th floor, has been completed. The 4th floor, including the roof, was completely rebuilt and three flats were incorporated. In the course of the renovations, the basement was also remodelled (as well as the staircase) and refurbished according to current fire safety regulations. The façade of the building was cleaned and renovated. Financing was provided by various loans from congregations or institutions connected to the Christian Community. The additional rental income is intended to add to the contributions to the stipends for the priests in the future.

Interestingly, most of our communities have begun to re-look at their constitutions and re-assess their relevance to their current situation. Particularly in Johannesburg the view is also to bring in the aspect of Threefoldness and how it is currently endeavouring to be expressed. There is also a restructuring of trustee bodies going on, mostly age-related. It seems younger congregants are reluctant to commit to such voluntary long-term roles. Part of this looking at the earthly side of things is reflected in questioning the fact that we are dependent on being landlords of rental property.

Across the Region we are responding to the need to de-centralize, which is evoked through the see-saw of restrictions. In preparation for 2022 and looking forward the topic of the 'Reappearance of Christ' has been picked up and small groups form to meet and study this, often using Hans-Werner Schroeder's booklet. The endeavour is to come from head to heart and into experiencing how this reappearance manifests, also in the sacraments and in life.

Switzerland, Southwest Europe

Two years ago, the summer conferences, which play a major role in each of the Swiss countries, were under threat in Spain and Italy. During their respective founding phases, it was the annual

meeting which was the driving force for the founding in both countries. In addition, there are members and friends in the various countries and in France who live far away from any congregation and who therefore are particularly looking forward to the meetings in summer. There will be alternative programmes on offer for children and/or young people, so that families can also take part. However, a certain fatigue had set in, and as there were only a few registrations it was decided to give it a break.

However, by now due to the pandemic, the desire for personal encounters had become so strong that, for example, in Italy there were 135 participants this year. Many applications were unsuccessful and for the coming year the wish to have two summer conferences in succession was expressed. In Spain, too, it was no longer a question that a meeting would take place and, France too reported a renewed impulse and high quality of the meeting. In Italy and Spain, suitable recreational accommodation is being sought in restful places e. g, mountain region or by the sea. In France, the meeting place has for a long time been at the youth seminary Foyer Michaël in Saint-Menoux in the heart of the country.

A tentative start was made in Portugal with a small children's camp, lasting several days and, an extended congregational weekend during the summer. In Switzerland, too, children's holiday camps and family retreats were held at our conference centre in Walkringen, well attended and largely unaffected by the pandemic. Soon to follow is the "Reflective Hiking" in the mountains, which has become very much a tradition.

In the four "romanischen" countries of our region, in-depth seminars for young people and young adults will soon begin, not only but also with the aim of maybe recruiting new candidates for the priest seminary. In France in particular, the shortage of priests is dramatic, with only three priests still in fulltime work, that's fewer than ever before, apart from the beginnings 75 years ago!

The Sozialwerk in Berlin

Ruhrstr. 11, 10709 Berlin offers a very special place of recuperation: There is a small holiday house in **31195 Lamspringe, Hellegrund 11**.



Years ago a little holiday house was bequeathed to our Sozialwerk for "members and priests of the congregation in need of recuperation" in the hamlet Lamspringe, in a very charming relaxing countryside of the Vorharz. Lamspringe is situated in the county Hildesheim in the southern Lower Saxony, it is an officially approved place of recuperation near the Heber, and it is member of the region Leinebergland. In the neighbourhood are Goslar, the old diocesan town Hildesheim, the saline steam and mud baths Bad Salzdethfurt, Bad Gandersheim the town of St Roswitha, and

Alfels/Leine, all of them with rich cultural offers. An excursion into the Harz nearby is worthwhile in every season of the year.

Lamspringe is not far from the motorway A7 (exit at Bockenem or Rhüden/Harz), the major roads B 3, B 64 and B 243. The nearest stations are <u>Bodenburg</u>, <u>Freden/Leine</u>, <u>Bad Gandersheim</u> and Hildesheim, where you'll have Intercity connections. The holiday house is a little distance outside of the village. You do your shopping in the little town; walking there takes approximately half an hour, going by car only few minutes.



Directly around the holiday house there is a superb wood of beeches, which invites you with its tidy paths to go for a walk. The garden, 600 m² big, can be used as playground, grill place or to bask in the sun, but as a working place for amateur gardeners as well. The little house with a living area of about 60 m² has a fully equipped kitchen, bathroom, a large living room with a balcony and a panoramic view

into an enchanting countryside, a children's room with a step-ladder bed and a bedroom for the parents. A heating system for off-peak electricity and a fireplace stove provides warmth.

The entire house is comfortably furnished. For your own requirements you may bring with you bedclothes, terry towelling, and tea towels. To cover the running costs we ask for \in 50 per day; at your departure we would like you to do a final cleaning, which can be dropped by paying \in 35.
